

Reflections of the Week

Scripture scholars believe that Jesus' ministry lasted about three years. The Gospel narratives of his preaching, miracles, parables, and encounters with others took up only a small fraction of that time. No doubt Jesus spent a lot of days, week in and week out, traveling from village to village. One can imagine that after a year or two of this many of his disciples got tired or restless. It makes sense that he would address today's parable specifically to his disciples. Maybe he even noticed their bodies dragging and their spirits flagging. Thus, he impresses upon them the need for persistence—in their prayer, in their ministry, and in their faith. If even a dishonest judge responds to a persistent soul, so much more will God.

Today's parable also addresses the need for persistence in pursuing justice. Widows in that time were some of the neediest people around. They no longer had a husband to support them in this patriarchal culture. They did not have any government programs. If they didn't have family that could help, they were soon destitute. Thank goodness that widows, like orphans and refugees, were entitled to special priority by Jewish law. So much more does God recognize that priority. We too are called to persist both in calling out to God and in calling out for justice. And when we see someone tire or grow weak, we are called to support them, as Aaron and Hur did many centuries ago.

Nearly two thousand years have passed since the Gospels and we still have poor people living on the margins of society, armies killing each other in war, and people suffering from persistent injustice. It would be easy to conclude that God does not answer the prayers of people in need. Jesus is right to wonder if anyone will still have faith in God by the time he returns. But he himself is the answer to the prayers of those in need. He himself is proof that when God intervened in the most concrete way possible out of love for us, it was not to end all the world's suffering, but to share that suffering with us and win us our salvation.

Ouestion of the Week

As this is the Jubilee Year of Hope, can I remain hopeful that God will address my needs and use that hope to help me persist in prayer? Can I promise to do so for ten minutes each day this week?

Are You A Catholic In "Good Standing?"

There may come a time when you are asked to be the godparent for a child who will be baptized in the Catholic faith, or you may be asked to serve as a sponsor for a confirmation candidate. In both of these instances, the church where the sacrament will be received usually will request a letter from your parish stating that you are a registered parishioner in good standing. What this means is that you are a practicing Catholic at least 16 years old who has already received the sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Communion; you regularly attend Mass and receive the sacraments; and you live a life of faith which is fitting for the role of godparent or sponsor. In short, you must be someone who takes their Catholic faith seriously enough that you may serve as a mentor for the person who is going to be baptized or receive confirmation. It does not suffice that you are simply a family member or close friend of the parents whose child will be baptized or the person who is going to receive confirmation.

Now let's say you do fulfill all the criteria needed and now only have to provide a letter of good standing issued from your parish. How do you go about getting this? Well obviously if you are on a first name basis with the pastor at your church who knows your level of commitment and that you are a practicing Catholic, this would not be an issue. But what if you've never gotten to know the pastor of your church personally? How would he be able to decide if you were someone who would be a suitable godparent or sponsor? Well one way to definitely ensure that you are regularly attending Mass would be to use the weekly donation envelopes mailed to every parishioner who has registered with the church, even if it only has \$1 in it. This way, when the Office checks your contribution history, they can tell the pastor that according to their records, you do attend Mass on a regular basis. Another way to show that you are a practicing Catholic would be if you know someone from the church personally whom the pastor trusts and could vouch for you to him. Finally, the last way would be to speak with the pastor directly. Hopefully he will remember seeing you each week when you shake his hand and greet him after every Sunday Mass. So make sure if nothing, you at least do this and are not a completely unknown entity who has suddenly appeared out of nowhere requesting a letter from the parish.
