Reflections of the Week

How appropriate that we hear this Gospel on the shortest day of the year, the day with the least sunlight. Joseph's hopes and dreams must have seemed bleak when he realized that his betrothed was found with child. But just as the winter solstice turns around the six-month process of ever-decreasing light with the slow but sure progress of longer and more direct sunlight, Joseph's dream turns his dashed hopes around to the joy that the woman he chose for his wife has also been chosen by God to be the mother of our Savior. Steadily and resolutely, we will be saved from the deep darkness of sin. No matter how low we may feel, God is always with us to turn our situation around.

"Do not be afraid," (Matthew 1:20) the angel says to Joseph, echoing the words Gabriel said to Mary when telling her that she would bear God's Son. Joseph, being a righteous man, no doubt feared involvement in a situation that was (apparently) sinful. In one sense, the angel's explanation is reassuring, for not only was Mary not unfaithful, she would bear the Son who would save people from their sins. However, the import of helping to raise such a child and the responsibilities that would result could have greatly increased Joseph's anxiety. But upon waking, he immediately decides to obey the angel, to obey God. He commits himself to God's plan, challenging as it will surely be.

Joseph could have publicly accused Mary of infidelity immediately, before he had the opportunity to be visited by an angel. But he did not and his initial small act of mercy, his decision to not expose Mary to shame, presages the great act of divine mercy that will soon come into the world. Our small human acts of mercy may seem inadequate or unimportant, but when they participate in the divine mercy that God has shown repeatedly, they may themselves lead to something greater. If nothing else, they add to the amount of mercy operating in the world, and that is always a good thing.

CHRIST IS COMING

The journey of Advent—a journey of waiting and hope—is now drawing to a close. Over the past three weeks, we have reflected on the different dimensions of Christ's coming. In the **first week**, a time of **hope and watchfulness**, we focused on Christ's second coming at the end of time.

We were invited to stay awake, alert, and ready, living with hearts attentive to His presence.

The **second week** called us to **preparation and conversion**. Through the voice of John the Baptist, we heard the urgent call to "prepare the way of the Lord," turning our hearts toward repentance and inner renewal.

Then came the **third week—Joy!** Gaudete Sunday. The rose candle reminded us that Christian hope is

And now we arrive at the fourth and final week of Advent. In just three days, we will celebrate the birth of Christ, the Word made Flesh, incarnated into our finite world. Our gaze turns to the Blessed Virgin Mary and the profound mystery of God becoming human. In her, we learn that love enters the world quietly, humbly, and intimately.

As we approach the holy manger in a few days, let us remember to BE WITH God Almighty, who humbles Himself to become so small, so close, that all may embrace Him. Listen for His gentle whisper in your heart, unveiling the mystery of His love—eternal from all ages, now made visible among us.

Jubilee Year of Hope
What are the memoirs of this Jubilee thus far? Did you

have a chance to visit the Holy Doors to pray, engage in inner renewal, and receive the plenary indulgences? You still have until December 28 to do the above. (Please do not hesitate to stop by our parish office or search online for more information.)

As we come to the close of this Holy Year of Hope, we do so not with an ending, but with a sending forth. Hope has been renewed in us—not as an idea, but as a Person. Christ has come among us, walked with us, and gently reshaped our hearts.

Throughout this holy year, Mother Church has reminded us again that hope does not disappoint, for it is rooted in God's faithfulness. It is born in silence, sustained in waiting, and fulfilled in love. The God we hoped for has drawn near—so near that He chose to dwell among us. As this holy year concludes, may the hope we have received become the hope we share. May it be carried into our families, our communities, and the quiet places of our daily lives.
