Reflections of the Week

Interestingly, when Jesus begins his mission and goes out to call disciples, he does not go to Jerusalem, to the temple, or to a synagogue at all. No, he goes down to the shores of the Sea of Galilee. As he told religious authorities later, he came to call sinners, not the righteous. Therefore, he chooses to go down to the sea to walk among sailors and fishers, not up to the synagogue to find those at prayer. When you wonder whether you are being called by the Lord and think yourself to be unworthy, know that you are unworthy. But this is exactly why Jesus is calling you.

By our baptism, we are each called to be disciples of the Lord. We are called to follow Jesus. What do we see when we follow him? We see him “teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom, and curing every disease and illness among the people” (Matthew 4:23). When he later sends out his disciples in pairs, these are the things he calls upon them to do. We are Jesus’ hands and voices now, called to spread the gospel, to teach lessons by word and deed, to bring healing to the afflicted, and to care for those in need. Today we hear how he sets an example for the first disciples . . . and for his current disciples.

Saint Paul urges the Corinthians to unity in Christ. The problem Paul addresses is not one of diversity, for indeed Paul initiated diversity by preaching in cities and towns all over the Mediterranean, where he encountered many different cultures, languages, and traditions. No, the problem was divisiveness and rivalries. Corinthians were allying with the person who introduced them to Christ, rather than with Christ himself. The church, Paul realized, must be one, and be one in Christ.

Why Go To Mass on Sunday?

There are many people today who will be quick to tell you that they are Catholic, but how many of them are actually attending Mass on Sunday? Some may wonder, “*Why should I go to Mass at all?*”

First of all, we go to Mass because we are spiritually hungry and to receive the help we need to live a Christian life. We hear God’s word and are nourished by the Lord’s body and blood in the Eucharist. We need God’s help to keep going in life and deal with any problems we may have. Active participation at the Eucharist is rewarded by God’s grace and help.

Secondly, the 3rd Commandment says to “Keep holy the Sabbath Day.” Since earliest times, Christians have observed Sunday as a day of worship and rest in order to honor the Resurrection of the Lord Jesus. The Church teaches that Catholics have a serious obligation to participate in Mass every Sunday and on Holy Days of obligation. Willfully disobeying this precept is seriously sinful, whereas reverent obedience can bring about wonderful blessings in our lives.

Thirdly, by participating in Sunday Eucharist, we become a part of the Christian community where we live or where we happen to be. We are called to enter into relationships with others on our Christian journey through this life to the Father. Active involvement in a broad range of parish activities, beginning with Mass, give great meaning to our lives and provides opportunities for deep, sustaining friendships.

Being in the habit of regular Mass attendance brings with it a spiritual discipline that helps an individual throughout the rest of the week. It is a strong sign of our Catholicity, an anchor to hold on to so that our spiritual values will not be overcome by the materialistic ones.

In the long run, active participation in Sunday Eucharist is the bare minimum for being a good Catholic. Much more is needed if we are to allow our faith to be an intimate part of our lives. However, a Catholic who doesn’t participate in Mass every Sunday is a Catholic whose spiritual hunger is not being fed.

FAITHFUL STEWARD OF GOD'S GIFTS

A member of our OCIA class has completed all her assignments. Recognizing the need to deepen her understanding of the Catholic faith, she invested both heart and mind into learning and loving her faith more deeply. She discovered that visual aids—such as images on the capital sins and virtues—were especially helpful in retaining and integrating what she learned.

At times, we admire heroes from afar because of their courage and self-sacrifice. We often describe such lives as *saintly*, marked by heroic virtue. Yet sainthood is not meant to be distant or unattainable. Who are the “saints” in your midst? Could you be one? If not, why not? In the words of Saint Carlo Acutis, a teenage saint of our time: *“Holiness is not about multiplying things, but about reducing them—allowing God to be more present in our lives.”*

For Carlo, sanctity was found in simplicity, purity of heart, and making room for God in everyday life—an invitation open to each of us.



SEEKING GOD

A parishioner set out to seek God among those experiencing homelessness along Goldenwest Street and beyond. While it would have been easier to stop at a fast-food restaurant and purchase ready-made meals, she felt called to do more.

She wanted those she served to know the food was intentionally prepared for them, packed with the care and dignity of a family meal.


